A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

The last time I wrote a letter for our annual report, the year was 2019, and I commented on how challenging the prior year had been. I had no way of knowing how much our lives would change as we celebrated in 2019 and plunged into a pandemic less than one year later.

Since our last in-person annual meeting, much has changed. We elected a slate of officers and new directors virtually for three years, changed how we communicate, watched racial and political unrest grip our nation, and watched a war rage on in Ukraine. And our United Way changed as well.

United Ways across the country continue to see declines in workplace giving, and our organization was no different. Political and social unrest continues to grip our nation, and fear, coupled with inflation and the after-effects of COVID-19 have put family and financial stability ahead of charitable giving. Yet, for over 100 years, the Lycoming County United Way has mobilized the collective resources of communities in three counties to improve and change lives as we continue to fight for the health, education, and financial stability of every person in every community.

For the last few years, our annual resource development efforts produced less revenue, and yet, we have been able to help members of our communities over 70,000 times, as we have worked with our community partners to find new ways to make an impact. The pandemic taught us to be agile and flexible, and we worked more closely with organizations like other regional United Ways and the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania to stand up the COVID-19 United Community Funds, crossing county borders to help those most in need. We worked with 14 regional United Ways and WBRE/WYOU to launch the United Way Cares media campaign to raise dollars for the work we were all doing in our communities.

While we have not fully recovered from the effects of the pandemic, we are committed to our mission. Many told their stories on camera, shared cardboard stories,

volunteered for days of caring, and many more supported us financially. Relationships grew stronger, and social media continues telling stories of help and hope.

Our willingness to try new things like Project Lifesaver, trauma-informed vaccine hesitancy education, new partnerships with organizations like Cummins, unique programs in partnership with local churches and the City of Williamsport, and a renewed sense of purpose keeps us vibrant and challenged to do more things and to be more significant.

Greatness comes from a vision for what we can be as a community, the commitment of an energetic and dedicated staff, a generous community, and the leadership of a supportive board. Almost six years from when I started, I am honored and privileged to lead this organization.

We are grateful for those who have gone before and those who are yet to come and who work side by side with us to make an impact. Change does not happen alone, and we are United for the Future as we continue to LIVE UNITED.

LEADERSHIP GIVING - TOCQUEVILLE SOCIETY

The United Way Tocqueville Society recognizes local philanthropic leaders and volunteer champions in the United States, France and Romania who have devoted time, talent, and funds to create long-lasting changes by tackling our communities' most serious issues.



Renowned French political philosopher Alexis de Tocqueville admired three elements in North American society: liberty, equality and the spirit of neighbor helping neighbor. These same elements are embraced in the French national motto: "Liberté, Egalité, Fraternité." Tocqueville believed that by achieving these elements of democracy, all people would choose to pursue freedom, knowledge and prosperity, or indépendance, connaissance, and prospérité.

Today over 25,000 Tocqueville members strong, since 1984 over \$9 billion has been contributed by Tocqueville members. Membership in the Society is granted to individuals who contribute at least \$10,000 annually to United Way. National Society Membership is granted to individuals who contribute \$100,000 or more per year to the United Way. Partnership with the United Way's Million Dollar Roundtable is limited to individuals who have contributed \$1,000,000 or more to the United Way mission and impact work.

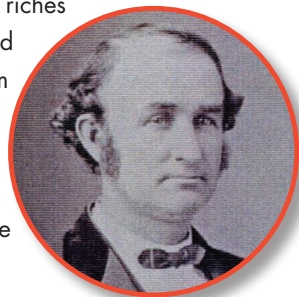

LEADERSHIP GIVING - PETER HERDIC SOCIETY

Born in Fort Plains, New York, in 1824, the promise of lumber riches brought Peter Herdic to Pennsylvania in 1853. In 1857, he and two other local businessmen purchased the Susquehanna Boom Company. Using his political influence, Herdic then convinced the legislature to raise boom tolls from \$.50 to \$1.25 per thousand feet of logs. In its peak year in 1873, the boom processed nearly 320 million feet of logs, earning considerable profits for Herdic and his partners.



In 1869, Herdic was elected as the third mayor of Williamsport. He owned the gas works and sold land to the railroads to bring them into the city (routing them through other Herdic property to increase its value). He built office buildings, a waterworks, an urban railway, and a bridge over the Susquehanna River. Herdic also owned the local newspaper. But in addition to his business enterprises, he donated homes to the working class, erected churches on donated land, and constructed public buildings and signed them over to the city. Some sources claim his philanthropic activities severely depleted his finances and that he hovered between wealth and ruin on a yearly basis.

2022 Douglas C. Dickey Humanitarian Award

Honoring a long-time community philanthropist and leader, the Lycoming County United Way (LCUW) has selected Mrs. Catharine "Kay" Ertel to receive the organization's highest honor, the Douglas C. Dickey Humanitarian Award. The award will be presented at the organization's annual meeting and awards event on April 13, 2023, at the Holiday Inn Downtown, 100 Pine Street, Williamsport.

The award is presented annually to individuals whose dedication, commitment, and outstanding leadership have made a significant contribution to the welfare of Lycoming County. Presented annually since 1947, the award was renamed

from the Lycoming United Way Award in 1997 to honor the memory of the late LCUW President Douglas C. Dickey, who was among those lost in the crash of TWA Flight 800.

Several members of the nominating committee for the award, past recipients themselves, described Mrs. Ertel as a lifelong servant and leader in our community.

"As a past award recipient, I am pleased to welcome Mrs. Ertel into a group of honorees who have dedicated their lives to service in our community and our organization," reflected Ron Frick, President of the Lycoming County United Way. "Kay has been a long-time donor of the United Way as well as other nonprofit organizations in our community, and she and her late husband Allen have been instrumental in the rebirth of the former Bethune Douglas Community Center, now Firetree Place, which offers programs for children and families who need before and after school care. Her quiet but committed philanthropy is worthy of this honor and recognition." We are also honored to have this year's award sponsored by UPMC.

John Brunette, current board chair, commented, "Speaking on behalf of the Firetree Place Board of Directors, we believe that Kay Ertel's selection as the Humanitarian Award recipient is an honor long overdue. When Firetree Place opened, Kay insisted that we create programs for children in our Before School, After School, and Summer Camp programs that help prepare kids to be successful adults. The Firetree Place mission, "Where growth plus development equals success," is reflected in the soft and social skills curriculum found in every activity we offer. One of Kay's lasting legacies is improving the lives of children."

In addition to her decades-long support of the United Way, Kay and her late husband Allen established Firetree Place in 2015, and she served on the Firetree Place board of directors and as its President.

Mrs. Ertel also served in leadership of the YWCA Northcentral PA as a director, trustee, capital campaign chair, and President. She received the Blanche Smink Volunteer Award in 1988. She was an active member of the Junior League of Williamsport, chaired local campaigns for the March of Dimes, and was involved in Preservation Williamsport. Mrs. Ertel also served the Lycoming County Democratic Women's Club as a director and served the Pennsylvania Democratic Women's Clubs as its Chair.

Mr. and Mrs. Ertel were also instrumental in establishing the Taylor J. Ertel Foster Child Scholarship Foundation in memory of their son, Taylor. Mrs. Ertel served as a Board member and the Executive Director for many years.

Professionally, Kay taught high school English as well as second grade. She was also a Head Start teacher. She also served many years as a PTA volunteer and Sunday School teacher.
